Johnston's Army at Greensboro, North Carolina May 1865. In October and December, 1862, two independent companies of cavalry were ordered by General Bragg to report to the 13th (McKenzie's) Tennessee Cavalry Battalion, and on December 16, 1862, by order of the Secretary of War, the battalion was raised to a regiment and officially designated as the 5th (McKenzie's) Tennessee Cavalry Regiment."

"Organized September 6, 1861; Confederate service September and October 1861; reorganized September, 1862; formed part of 4th Consolidated Tennessee Infantry Regiment which was paroled at Greensboro, North Carolina, May 1, 1865. Co. 'I' - men from Roane County."

### **43rd Tennessee Infantry Regiment (also called 5th East Tennessee Volunteer Regiment. 43rd Mounted Infantry)**

"Organized December 14, 1861; reorganized May 10, 1862, paroled at Washington, Georgia May, 1865, as part of President Jefferson Davis' Escort. Company F was organized November 9, 1861 in Roane County."

**62nd Tennessee Infantry Regiment (also called 80th Infantry Regiment; Rowan's Tennessee Infantry Regiment: 62nd Tennessee Mounted Infantry Regiment -**

"Organized October 8, 1862; mustered into Confederate service November 11, 1862; surrendered at Vicksburg July, 1863; served remainder of war as mounted infantry in Brigadier General John C. Vaughn's Brigade in East Tennessee and Western Virginia. Company F enrolled September 24. Men from Roane County."

**63rd Tennessee Infantry Regiment (also called 74th Tennessee Infantry Regiment)**

-

"Organized July 30, 1862; surrendered and paroled at Appomattox Courthouse, April 9, 1865. Company B organized May 12, at Knoxville, from Roane County. Some men were formerly in the 26th Tennessee Infantry, others from Co. "E", 3rd Tennessee Cavalry Battalion."

**Welcker's Tennessee Cavalry Battalion (State Troops) -**

"This Battalion was organized August 7, 1863, at Kingston, Roane County, for service only in Tennessee. The term of enlistment was for only six months, and it was mustered out of service in January, 1864. It was composed of only two companies: Company A - Captain James Johnson, organized August 7, 1863; Company B - Captain J.M. Kincaid, organized August 11, 1863, B.F. Welcker was the first captain of this company, but was elected as major of the battalion and Kincaid succeeded him as captain."

**Co. K, Thomas' Legion, North Carolina Infantry -**

Was Mustered in on September 27, 1862 with Thomas A. Butler as Captain at Winter's Gap (now Oliver Springs). Raised to scout for bushwhackers in Roane and Anderson Counties. Stationed at Winter's Gap until April 1863 when joined the rest of Thomas' Legion.
